## ILLEGAL MINING ('GALAMSEY') A THREAT TO GHANA'S FOOD SECURITY AND NATIONAL SECURITY

The National Seed Trade Association of Ghana (NaSTAG) expresses serious concern over the devasting impact of illegal mining, commonly known as 'galamsey', on Ghana's environment and agricultural sector. Our greatest concern is the potential threat to seed production and overall agricultural productivity in Ghana. Ghana currently faces a seed production deficit of approximately 50%, a situation that will only deteriorate if the 'galamsey' crisis is not addressed with urgency and resolve.
